I let a song go out of my heart

Duke Ellington and his men moved into the big time when they were hired by the management of the Cotton Club in New York. They stayed there from December 4, 1927, until 1932 Recording sessions took place regularly under Ellinaton's own name and the band became widely known outside the U.S.A.

"Mood indigo," originally recorded in 1930 as "Dream blues," proved the first big hit recorded by Duke. The "tonal" arrangements, the unique voicing of the orchestra, and the individuality of each of the band's members, those were (and still are) the factors that explained most of the success.

"It don't mean a thing, if it ain't got that swing," Ellington once told somebody. The maxim has been lived up to ever since by every Ellington line-up - as is proved by this and every other record that Ellington has made. His European tours during the 'thirties brought him and his band fame and publicity. The first tour was in 1933, the second in 1939.

Until 1939, constancy of personnel enabled Ellinaton to build up an ensemble of tremendous precision, and this in itself ensured great listening pleasure. Then, in 1939, came three major changes: Billy Strayhorn was added as assistant arranger, Jimmy Blanton started to play bass, and Ben Webster occupied the tenor Personnel and dates:
