This EP features new recordings of great standards played by the Ellington band. A glance at the repertoire will convince you of the importance of the selection. Although the Duke has written quite a number of success such as "Harlem speaks," "Black beauty," "Mørry-go-round," "Such Sweet Thunder," and "Liberian Suite," we believe the songs heard on this record are three of those that the centeral public know, and love heat.

general public know and love best.

Duke Ellington (often assisted by his close friend and co-operator Billy Strayhorn, whose efforts for the band deserve the highest praise) loves to rewrite or recompose his own works from time to time. This is the case with the present record. "The mooche" and "Mood indigo" (the latter originally written under the title "Dreamy blues"), date from the early Ellington period, whereas "Take the 'A' train' dates from the 'artist.

"The mooche" reminds us strongly of the "jungle style" period, with its growling brass and heavy rhythm.

"Mood indigo" - one of Ellington's oldest successes - is very different. Shorty Baker plays a neat trumpet in the first chorus, replacing the familiar and traditional sound of the trambones and bass clarinet. Billy Strayhorn's composition. "Take the "A" train" - the theme song of the Ellington band - has been rewritten to provide solos by Jimmy Hamilton (clarinet) and Clark

Terry (trumpet).
One often hears that the music of Duke Ellington is limeless. There seems to be every reason to believe this statement, because no matter how often the meastro rewrites his numbers, the basic structure of the melodic line and the typical Ellington phrasing remain unchanged.
