DUKE ELLINGTON AND HIS ORCHESTRA 1932 - 1933

uke Ellington and his Orchestra recorded songs from the incredibly successful "Blackbirds of 1928" as early as July 1928, within a few weeks of the show's Broadway opening. They were back in the studios for the same purpose, together with stars from the original cast, at the end of 1932. These outstanding tracks are included on this CD.

Edward Kennedy "Duke" Ellington was born in Washington, D.C., on April 29, 1899. While still at high school, he began playing in his native city. He soon organized his first little group, "The Duke's Serenaders", including Otto Hardwick and Arthur Whetsol, both of whom were to remain with him for many years. Duke Ellington first came to New-York in 1923 with "The Washingtonians", then still led by Elmer Snowden. A year later, the highly ambitious Duke Ellington took over the group and worked with it successfully at the "Kentucky Club" until 1927. The developing band's most successful engagement, at the "Cotton Club", lasted until 1931, when the fledgling Cab Calloway Orchestra took over their spot. Duke Ellington's first tour to England, Scotland and France in 1933 proved an immense personal and musical triumph. During the thirties, the Duke and his Orchestra travelled extensively in the United States, and their second visit to Europe six months before the outbreak of war enabled many of their admirers to hear the band in the flesh. Many agree that by 1940 the orchestra had reached its artistic peak. The band's first Carnegie Hall concert in January 1943 was followed by inumerable appearances at the world's most famous theatres. Duke Ellington was fortunately able to continue his regular tours around the globe until a short time before his death on May 24, 1974 - one month after celebrating his 75th birthday.

Our present volume of the complete recordings of Duke Ellington and his Orchestra in chronological order includes the majority of their cuts from 1932. Although they recorded less frequently than in previous years, several outstanding sides were made. In spring, Otto Hardwick, one of Duke's friends from the beginning of his career, boarded the "Ellington train" again after spending some four years with other bands. He would remain with the orchestra until 1946. Johnny Hodges plays the soprano sax solo on "Sheik Of Araby" which Sidney Bechet had taught him. "Ducky Wucky" certainly ranks among Ellington's best recordings of 1932. The compositions by limmy McHugh and Dorothy Fields from the aforementioned "Blackbirds of 1928" were originally issued as part of an ambitious album of six 78 r.p.m. records, containing re-recordings of the major hits from the show. The two versions of "Baby", featuring Adelaide Hall from the original cast, are very different, hence both are included. Ethel Waters, the star of the less successful "Blackbirds of 1930", sings a somewhat dramatic version of "I Can't Give You...", a song that had become one the great standards of American popular music.
