DUKE ELLINGTON AND HIS ORCHESTRA 1938

In his CD includes recordings both by Duke Ellington's full orchestra and by small-groups of musicians from within the band. Although some of these tracks may not rank among the most original in the vast Duke Ellington discography, Gunther Schuller's statement that "we constantly are reminded that even Ellington's lesser efforts are superior to most of the better work of his contemporaries" remains an irrefutable fact!

Edward Kennedy "Duke" Ellington was born in Washington, D.C., on April 29, 1899. While still at high school, he began playing in his native city. He soon organized his first little group, "The Duke's Serenaders", including Otto Hardwick and Arthur Whetsol, both of whom were to remain with him for many years. Duke Ellington first came to New-York in 1923 with "The Washingtonians", then still led by Elmer Snowden. A year later, the highly ambitious Duke Ellington took over the group and worked with it successfully at the "Kentucky Club" until 1927. The developing band's most successful engagement, at the "Cotton Club", lasted until 1931, when the fledgling Cab Calloway Orchestra took over their spot. Duke Ellington's first tour to England, Scotland and France in 1933 proved an immense personal and musical triumph. During the thirties, the Duke and his Orchestra travelled extensively in the United States, and their second visit to Europe six months before the outbreak of war enabled many of their admirers to hear the band in the flesh. Many agree that by 1940 the orchestra had reached its artistic peak. The band's first Carnegie Hall concert in January 1943 was followed by inumerable appearances at the world's most famous theatres. Duke Ellington was fortunately able to continue his regular tours around the globe until a short time before his death on May 24, 1974 one month after celebrating his 75th birthday.

This volume of the recordings of Duke Ellington in chronological order picks up with two additional tracks by Cootie Williams and His Rug Cutters. The full band then takes over for the sides that follow. On June 7, 1938, Ellington recorded "Rose Of The Rio Grande", which inspires a majestic solo from Lawrence Brown. The trombonist's elegant style provided a beautiful contrast with those of Tricky Sam Nanton and Juan Tizol. A rather commercial interpretation, which remained in the band's book for many years. The session ends with a track that once again proves Schuller's aforementioned contention. "A Gypsy Without A Song", recorded two weeks later, has been called "a masterpiece of period nostalgia". Most of the remaining tracks feature Johnny Hodges at his romantic best, particularly on the sentimental "You Walked Out Of The Picture", an item that also features Mary McHugh's airy voice. Besides being a master of the alto-sax, Hodges was an equally gifted soprano-saxophonist, and his playing on "Empty Ballroom Blues" documents this often overlooked aspect of his work. This CD ends with the first half of a Cootie Williams date, which brings an excellent vocal from Scat Powell on "Blue Is The Evening". Here is yet another fine singer of whom almost nothing is known. These 23 pieces of Ellingtonia were all recorded within less than four months! To be continued...


