DUKE ELLINGTON AND HIS ORCHESTRA 1945 - 1946

he period 1945/46, covered by the recordings on this CD, saw a number of changes in Duke Ellington's band: Oscar Pettiford was hired as bass player, certainly the best in Duke's band since Jimmy Blanton. In addition, veterans Otto Hardwick and Joe Nanton, both with Ellington since the early days also had to be replaced, altosaxophonist Hardwick retiring from the music scene whereas trombonist "Tricky Sam" Nanton died in July 1946. Edward Kennedy "Duke" Ellington was born in Washington, D.C., on April 29, 1899. While still at high school, he began playing in his native city. He soon organized his first little group, "The Duke's Serenaders", including Otto Hardwick and Arthur Whetsol, both of whom were to remain with him for many years. Duke Ellington first came to New-York in 1923 with "The Washingtonians", then still led by Elmer Snowden, A year later, the highly ambitious Duke Ellington took over the group and worked with it successfully at the "Kentucky Club" until 1927. The developing band's most successful engagement, at the "Cotton Club", lasted until 1931, when the fledgling Cab Calloway Orchestra took over their spot. Duke Ellington's first tour to England, Scotland, Holland and France in 1933 proved an immense personal and musical triumph. During the thirties, the Duke and his Orchestra travelled extensively in the United States, and their second visit to Europe six months before the outbreak of war enabled many of their admirers to hear the band in the flesh. Many agree that by 1940 the orchestra had reached its artistic peak. The band's first Carnegie Hall concert in lanuary 1943 was followed by innumerable appearances at the world's most famous theatres. Duke Ellington was fortunately able to continue his regular tours around the globe until a short time before his death on May 24, 1974 - one month after celebrating his 75th birthday. This volume of the chronological recordings of Duke Ellington opens with the studio version of another segment from the magnificent "Perfume Suite". "Time's A-Wastin'" is nothing other than a new version of "Things Ain't What They Used To Be" and is not related to Jimmy Lunceford's composition of the same title. "Dancers In Love" that concludes "Perfume Suite" turns out to be the most swinging chapter from this extended composition. (The four parts were recorded at two different sessions, hence they do not appear in succession here.) Both tracks from the October 1945 session, featuring Joya Sherrill, have Big Sid Catlett on drums in place of Sonny Greer who was absent for health reasons. Oscar Pettiford joined Ellington in mid-November. His full, warm bass playing can be heard on the opening bars of "Long, Strong And Consecutive" as well as on the following tracks of this CD - with the noteworthy exception of "Tonk" and "Drawing Room Blues". These duos once more underline to what extent the leader's and Billy Strayhorn's piano playing and musical concepts were close. Three tracks from V-Discs lead into an extended session, recorded on two consecutive days in July 1946. "Suddenly It Jumps" swings enormously - due in a large part to Oscar Pettiford's dynamic playing. "Transblucency", no doubt one of the highlights among Duke's compositions, is an elaboration of Lawrence Brown's solo on "Blue Light" (Classics CD 747) recorded in 1938. This time Kay Davis' soprano voice and Jimmy Hamilton's clarinet are blended with Brown's gorgeous trombone, reminding the sound of a string quartet. Another gem in the same vein emerged in 1947, titled "On A Turqoise Cloud". "Just Squeeze Me" had previously been recorded by Rex Stewart in 1941 as "Subtle Slough" (see Classics 851). From now on, it was to be one of the featurenumbers of Ray Nance who also sings on the closing "Hey Baby". To be continued...
